

(NOTE: What follows is not a personal defense, nor a defense of bad judgment. Due to age and infirmities, some of our dear ones who love the Lord are not able to sit for long periods of time. Generally, the godly who suffer in the flesh are the last to murmur about "long preaching." It is those weak in the spirit, or one who has a hidden agenda, who hollers the loudest.)

Recently, a liberal brother visited our services and in a very gruff manner complained, "He preaches too long!" He let it be known that he was not a happy hearer! I reasoned with him, but he would not be calm, so I walked away and left him grumbling about the length of the sermon.

Perhaps some churches are used to 20 minute "sermonettes," sermons that have little Scripture, that do not rebuke sin, and that are decorated with cute, clever stories. They are accustomed to worship services that are convenient six packs of "Gospel Lite." That is, they have 60 minutes of time allotted for everything--announcements, singing, prayers, the Lord's supper, and a short "message" from the "pulpit minister." He entertains, creates smiles with his pleasing manner and subtle wit, and accepts smatterings of laughter and applause. He leaves his audience with a "good warm feeling." He never speaks of hell or acts like he ever met anyone that will go there. He rarely uses the Bible to sustain his points, and never is heard to say a thing is true "because that's what the word of God teaches." No, that would be too dogmatic, even "legalistic." Instead, he sprinkles his talk with quotes from popular, "trendy" sources, and charms his audience with his personal grace and aplomb. Visitors go away without learning the difference between New Testament faith and that of the Methodist Church they attend. In other words, "Gospel Lite."

To such people, our services likely will be regarded as being "too long." But what of those who are "hungering and thirsting after righteousness"? "All things are ready," Jesus says, "come to the feast." However, you only have 15

or 20 minutes in which to eat! (Isn't it strange that the same brethren who complain about a "long sermon," are the ones who can sit for an hour on a metal folding chair in the fellowship hall!) In effect, they say, "Do not 'force' me to feed for more than 20 minutes on Him who is 'the bread of life,' but I will sit all afternoon at a picnic table!" Brethren, where are our priorities?

Consider Ezra. He spoke "from the morning until midday...and the ears of all the people were attentive unto the book of the law" (Neh. 8:3). If some of our brethren had been there, perhaps they would have started a whispering campaign to have Ezra removed from the pulpit because "he preaches too long!"

Consider Paul. He was "guilty" of "long preaching" (Acts 20:9). We do not know how "long" it was, but we know that it was "long" enough for the Holy Spirit to call it "long preaching." On another occasion, Paul preached "from morning till evening." (At least Ezra had the "good sense" to quit at "midday," but Paul went on "till evening." For shame!) Again, do you reckon someone went around trying to get the brethren to "fire" Paul from his apostleship because "he preaches too long"?

Consider Jesus. Jesus "continued all night in prayer to God" (Lk. 6:12). It is doubtful that those who whine and complain about a "long sermon" have ever prayed "all night to God."

When Jesus was waiting to die, he asked Peter, James, and John to be with him during those awful hours of agony. The disciples fell asleep. Jesus exclaimed, "What, could ye not watch with me for one hour" (Matt. 26:40)? The next time you are tempted to moan and groan about a sermon that goes a little longer than you think it should, let the Lord's question ring and echo in your ears, "Could you men not keep watch with me for one hour?"

A Hairy Reminder

A person between the ages of 20—30 has about 615 hair follicles per square centimeter. A person 50 years of age has around 485 hair follicles per square centimeter. Typically, most people have somewhere between 100,000—150,000 hairs on their head. By the way, the average hair loss for an individual is 50—100 hairs per day. As a result, there is no way you can tell accurately how many hairs you have (in fact, unless you are going bald, most of us don't really care). But God knows.

Jesus said: "Are not two sparrows sold for a cent? And yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Therefore do not fear; you are of more value than many sparrows" (Matt. 10:29-31). This passage reveals three interesting truths.

First, **God knows more about us than we know about us.** That is a humbling thought. When we sometimes feel like no one under-

stands us or grasps our situation, we forget that God does. God knows your personality. God knows your strengths. God knows what motivates you. God knows when you stumble. God knows what you like and don't like. God knows the real you. Therefore, when God declares something worthwhile, He knows what He is talking about. When God warns about danger, He knows what He is talking about. When God tells us that we should do something, we need to do it, because He knows us better than we know ourselves.

God is a God of detail. How insignificant are hairs and sparrows to us. Yet God is aware of them. He is a God of details. The motives, attitudes and heart behind our actions are as important to Him as the actions themselves. It does little good to give, if you have left out the detail of being a cheerful. Singing fails if we neglect thankfulness in our heart. Let us be a people of details, as God is.

God cares about you. This is why Jesus referred to sparrows and hair. We are of value to Him. Christ was not sent to save the whales, the environment, or the endangered species, but mankind. Man has value! Stress and worry often make us wonder if God cares. These two simple illustrations remind us that He does.
