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"...even baptism doth also now save us..."

We have been examining in detail what God requires of us to be saved:

1) **Hear Christ** (Heb. 1:1-2); 2) **Believe in Christ** (Jn. 20:31); 3) **Repent** (Acts 17:30); 4) **Confess Christ** (Rom. 10:10); 5) **Be Baptized** (Mark 16:16); and, 6) **Live Faithfully** (Col. 1:22-23). Today we will consider baptism. Let's consider some important things about baptism.

- I) **Baptism Puts One Into Christ.** In Romans 6:3 and Galatians 3:27 we learn that we are "baptized into Christ." The Bible also teaches that salvation is "in Christ Jesus" (2 Tim. 2:10). Thus, Peter said in I Pet. 3:21, "The like figure whereunto even **baptism doth also now save us...**" So, dear reader, since salvation is in Christ and we are baptized into Christ have you been baptized? If not, you are not saved!
- 2) **Baptism Puts One Into the Church.** We are often told that one can be saved without being baptized at all. However, baptism places an individual in the "one body" (I Cor. 12:13) which is the church (Col. 1:24) purchased with Jesus' blood (Acts 20:28). Jesus is the savior of the body (Eph. 5:23) and the only way to get into the "one body" is to be baptized into it. Man is reconciled to God in the body of Christ (Col. 1:20-22). Thus, one can no more be saved without baptism than one can be reconciled to God without being in Christ's body or church.
- 3) **Baptism Is A Must**. In Acts 9:6 the Lord told Saul to "Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou **must** do." So we know that whatever he was told to do was a <u>must</u>. In Acts 22:16 we learn that one thing he was told was to "arise, and be baptized." Something that is a "must" is not optional and baptism is a "must." Thus, it is not optional it is required by God to obtain salvation!
- 4) **Baptism Is A Command Of Christ.** This is recorded in both Matthew 28:19-20 and Mark 16:15-16. In Ephesians 4:5 this is referred to as the "one baptism" and as a result it is the only baptism of the Bible that is in force today.

Have you been baptized "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"? (Matt. 28:19) If not, you do not have "the remission of [your] sins" (Acts 2:38), you have not washed "away your sins" (Acts 22:16), you remain outside the body of Christ in which sinful men are reconciled to God (1 Cor. 12:13; Col. 1:20-22). So, "why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16) If we can be of any assistance in helping you obey God's simple command, give us a call.

Answering Some Objections To Bible Baptism Craig Thomas

- 1) Jesus Didn't Say, "He that is not baptized shall be damned." Mark 16:16 teaches that it takes two things to be saved; belief <u>and</u> baptism. However, it only takes one thing to be lost; just don't believe! Thus, John said, "He that believeth on him is not condemned, but he that believeth not is condemned already." (Jn. 3:18)
- 2) The Word "for" in Acts 2:38 Means "because of." The same Greek word "eis" which is translated "for" in Acts 2:38 is the same word used in Matthew 26:28 where Jesus said, "For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Jesus' blood was shed for, "to the intent that" sins be remitted, not for, "because" sins had already been remitted. Likewise, baptism is for ("to the intent that") remission of sins, not "because of" remission of sins.
- 3) Water Can't Wash Away Sins, Only Jesus' Blood. This is correct! Nowhere does the New Testament teach that water, in and of itself, can save people. However, the only way for a person to contact the blood of Jesus is by obeying the command to be baptized (Jn. 19:32-34; Rom. 6:3-4; cf. 1 Pet. 3:21).
- 4) We Are Saved By Faith And Not Works. It's true there are some works that cannot save (Gal. 2:16; Eph. 2:8-9; Titus 3:5; I Jn. 3:8). However, there are works "which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:10). Jesus described faith as a work of God (Jn. 6:28-29). These are the type of works that save and baptism is included among these "God ordained" works (Jn. 3:3,5; Titus 3:5; Heb. 5:9; 10:22). The only time "faith only" appears in the Bible it is condemned! (see Jas. 2:14-26, esp. v. 24)
- 5)"The Thief Was Saved Without Being Baptized!" First of all, if one makes this argument, they must prove the thief was not baptized. This cannot be done (Matt. 3:1-6). We must realize that Christ was alive when He told the thief, "This day shalt thou be with me in paradise." Therefore, the thief lived and died under the law of Moses. The will of Christ did not come into effect until after Jesus died (Heb. 9:16-17). Fifty three days after Christ died the gospel was preached and along with it baptism (Acts 2:38). You can't hold a man responsible to a law that came into effect 53 days after his death! Who wants to be saved like a thief anyway? Instead of trying to think up ways to get around it, won't

you join me and simply submit to Jesus' command to be baptized (Mk. 16:15:16)? Baptism washed away Saul's sins...don't you want your sins washed away too? If so, then "arise and be baptized...calling on the name of the Lord." (Acts 22:16)

Expenses do not cease when one of us is away. Our duty before God to give to His work. The cost of doing that work does not end when we leave town.

Perhaps you have just never thought of it before, and have carelessly neglected to "lay by in store" as the Bible teaches. Now, with this reminder, we can all do better in this regard, and the Lord's work will be done in a more orderly and efficient fashion (1 Cor. 14:40).
