Teach Us To Number Our Days

Psalm 90:12 says, "So teach us to number our days, That we may gain a heart of wisdom." This Psalm teaches us at least three critically important truths, let's examine them.

- 1) "Teach us". We need to learn something! We need to learn of God's eternal nature and mighty power. The Psalm says, "Before the mountains were brought forth. Or ever You had formed the earth and the world, Even from everlasting to everlasting, You are God." (Psa. 90:2) Read Isaiah 40:12-17. Surely you agree, "To whom then will you liken God?" (Isa. 40:18). God's powers and ways are far above man's, "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, Nor are your ways My ways." says the LORD. "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, So are My ways higher than your ways, And My thoughts than your thoughts." (Isa. 55:8-9) We must come to grips with our "powerlessness". Read Job 38:1-42:6. Notice Job's conclusion concerning God's power versus his own "powerlessness": "Then Job answered the LORD and said: 'I know that You can do everything, And that no purpose of Yours can be withheld from You. You asked, 'Who is this who hides counsel without knowledge?' Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, Things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. Listen, please, and let me speak; You said, 'I will question you, and you shall answer Me.' 'I have heard of You by the hearing of the ear, But now my eye sees You. Therefore I abhor myself, And repent in dust and ashes." Let us "gain a heart of wisdom" by learning these lessons.
- 2) "To Number Our Days". We must learn that our lives pass so quickly. Job lamented that his days were "swifter than a weaver's shuttle" (Job 7:6). We too must learn that our lives are "even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away" (Jas. 4:14). We cannot escape the inevitability of death and judgment because "it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment" (Heb. 9:27). Have you really learned these lessons?
- 3) "That We May Apply Our Hearts Unto Wisdom". The Bible says that people who don't appreciate their own mortality are fools! (Lk. 12:19-20) Our most valuable possessions are our soul and our time. Listen to Jesus, "For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" (Mt. 16:26) Therefore, let us "walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise, redeeming

the time" (Eph. 5:15-16). It is so easy to get caught up in the day-to-day "urgencies" of life and procrastinate the really important things. The day is coming when "we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive the things done in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad." (2 Cor. 5:10) Thus, let us heed Solomon's wisdom, "He who keeps His command will experience nothing harmful; And a wise man's heart discerns both time and judgment" (Eccl. 8:5). Are you applying your heart to wisdom? Are you "redeeming the time" and preparing your soul for eternity?

Much is said about "fellowship with God." The term, fellowship, is used by many who have no concept of "the communion (fellowship) of the Holy Spirit" (2 Cor. 13:14).

- (1) To some, it means association and acceptance with God apart from salvation. Baptists speak of those who are "out of fellowship with God" because of sin, but who, nonetheless, "maintain their salvation." Such a view is totally foreign to the word of God (2 Cor. 6:14-7:1; 1 Jn. 1:5-2:6).
- (2) Others associate "fellowship" with carnal, worldly, and physical activities. When atheists convene to fight against God, they have "fellowship." Workers have "fellowship" on the job. There is "fellowship" at a family reunion. Brethren who fish or drink coffee together have "fellowship." However, it is not the Biblical, spiritual fellowship spoken of in the word of God (1 Cor. 1:9; 1 Jn. 1:3, 7).

When brethren argue that one may be involved in moral sin and doctrinal error and yet maintain his "fellowship" with God, they sound like the Baptists under the first point above (Rom. 13:13, 14; 16:17). When brethren speak of leaving a worship assembly in order to "have a period of fellowship" in a dining area, they identify with the second position (1 Cor. 10:6, 7).

Elements Of Scriptural Fellowship

First, it is a state into which we are called "by the gospel" (I Cor. I:9; Eph. 3:6; 2 Thess. 2:14). One cannot have fellowship with God until he obeys the gospel (Cf. 2 Thess. I:8; 2:14). The apostles "declared" their message "that ye also may have fellowship with us: and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ" (I Jn. I:3). "Feel good" stories and amusing, heartwarming tales may lift one's self esteem, but they cannot convert the soul and give it fellowship with God (Rom. I:16; Psa. I9:7).

Second, one who is in fellowship with God is a member of the body, the church of Christ (Eph. 2:19-22; 3:6). Those who claim fellowship with God, but who are not members of the church, are deceived. Worse yet, they are lost (Eph. 2:12, 16). Those who dismiss preaching about the church as being out of date and old-fashioned cannot lead men to fellowship with God, for that fellowship can only be attained in the church (Eph. 2:16, 19-22; 3:6).

Third, living in sin and moral darkness is contrary to spiritual fellowship with God, for God has "called (us) out of darkness into his marvelous light" (I Pet. 2:9, II). Note the contrast between "the children of darkness" and the "children of light" (Eph. 5:6-II; I Thess. 5:4-7).

My dear, dying friend, are you in fellowship with God? If not, by obeying the gospel, you can be "called unto the fellowship of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord" (I Cor. 1:9). Why not do so today?

The Final Judgment

This final judgment will come unexpectedly, like a thief in the night (Matthew 24:36; 2 Peter 3:10). Acts 17:30-31 tells us that God has appointed A DAY in which He will judge the

Here are some of the things for which we will be judged: Our thoughts (Proverbs 23:7: 2 Corinthians 10:5); Secret things (Romans 2:6); Every work (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14); Our words (Matthew 12:36-37); All we have done (I John 3:4; Galatians 6:7-8); and what we have failed to do (James 4:17). This last one should be the most sobering thought that comes into our mind every day we live.

We know that God's judgment will be true, just, righteous, and everybody will be treated fairly and justly, and everyone will get what they deserve. There will be no appeals process, because there will be no error in judgment by the perfect God. Prepare to meet thy God.
