
A recent survey found that scientists, on the whole, are much less religious than the general public. In fact, scientists are roughly half as likely as the general public to believe in God or a higher power. According to the poll, just over half of scientists (51%) believe in some form of deity or higher power; specifically, 33% of scientists say they believe in God, while 18% believe in a universal spirit or higher power. By contrast, 95% of Americans believe in some form of deity or higher power. Specifically, more than eight in-ten Americans (83%) say they believe in God and 12% believe in a universal spirit or higher power. Finally, the poll of scientists finds that four-in-ten scientists (41%) say they do not believe in God or a higher power, while the poll of the public finds that only 4% of Americans share this view.

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Being Right and Living Right Craig Thomas

Undoubtedly the Bible teaches the importance of being "doctrinally correct," for 2 John 9 says: "Whoever transgresses and does not abide in the doctrine of Christ does not have God. He who abides in the doctrine of Christ has both the Father and the Son." By that I mean it's critical for us as God's people to follow the scriptural plan of salvation and the New Testament (NT) pattern for the worship, work, and organization of the church. Denominationalism perverts and/or ignores these important "doctrinal" issues. Over the years brethren have vehemently and militantly opposed the doctrinal innovations, perversions, and apostasies of the denominational world. It is good and right that we've done so, for we must (Jude 3). However, we must never forget there's more to being a faithful Christian than "doctrinal orthodoxy" on these matters.

- I) You're Getting Soft, You're Compromising. Some may cringe at the last statement and accuse me of getting soft or compromising the truth. That's not the case at all. In those areas mentioned we <u>must</u> be "doctrinally correct." But, if that is all we are, we fall far short of practicing pure New Testament Christianity. Unequivocally we can only practice pure New Testament Christianity when we've restored things like the scriptural plan of salvation and follow the New Testament pattern for the worship, work, and organization of the church. BUT, we must also just as certainly restore all of the aspects of Christian character and living. Otherwise our claim to having restored the New Testament church is merely a hollow, pharisaical boast!
- 2) Whole Counsel of God. Paul legitimately laid claim he was "innocent of the blood of all men," because he had "not shunned to declare...the whole counsel of God" (Acts 20:26-27). Do you suppose Paul's preaching and teaching stopped at the plan of salvation and the worship, work, and organization of the church? No! For example, he taught the need for individual Christians to reject conformity with the world and be totally transformed by God's word! (Rom. 12:1-2) He taught the need for individual Christians to reject every form and facet of fleshly, worldly behavior and become a new man! (Col. 3:5-14) He taught the necessity of practicing benevolence on an individual basis (Gal. 6:10; cf. Jas. 1:27). The Lord

Himself summed up what Paul surely taught in Matt. 22:37-40. True religion is not found in devotion to a doctrinal "system" or by satisfying oneself by being "doctrinally correct" on a few, albeit critical, points. True religion can only be found when one **totally** submits to all of God's will in humble, contrite obedience and glorifies God by imitating Jesus' virtuous life and treating one's fellow man with compassion and true concern. All else falls short!

3) **Balance.** Being a faithful Christian is like most things in the sense that truth is usually not found at the extremes, but at some balance point in the middle. To stress compassion and concern and ignore "doctrine" is not acceptable (2 Jn. 9-11). To stress "doctrinal correctness" without perfecting our individual walk with Christ (e.g., Phil. 1:27) is not accepta-

ble. To stress "doctrinal correctness" and our individual walk with Christ while ignoring our responsibilities to our fellow man is not acceptable either (Matt.

"Therefore, to him who knows to do good and does not do it, to him it is sin."

Jas. 4:17

25:31-46; Jas. 1:27). Denominationalists and some brethren are guilty of following these extremes. Let us be determined to truly restore New Testament Christianity in our lives by living it ALL! Remember, we must live by both James 4:17 and 2 John 9. In the process we'll grow, the church will grow, and we'll make it to heaven.

The Message of the Empty Seat

Jonathan said to David, "To morrow is the new moon: and thou shalt be missed, because thy seat will be empty" (I Samuel 20:18). One problem facing the church today is that of empty seats. The empty seat says... Some Are Not Putting First Things First. Jesus taught, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matthew 6:33). The kingdom, the Lord's church, is to come first before everything else. Whenever my seat is empty, does it say my priorities are mixed up?

Some Are of Little Faith

The context of Matthew 6:33 finds Jesus talking about folks who were worried about the material things of life. In verse 30 Jesus said, "Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to day is, and to morrow is cast into the oven, shall he not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith?" The Lord assures us that as we put the church first. He will take care of us. One reason seats are empty is that of folks not having enough faith in the Lord and His word.

Some Do Not Properly Value Their Influence

Whether we realize it or not, all of us possess influence. The Lord declared, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matthew 5:16). My at-

tendance, or lack thereof, has tremendous influence on others. Think about your influence on your fellow members, your family, visitors, new converts, and the like when your seat is empty. Wouldn't it be tragic if your lack of attendance influenced others to not attend?

Some Do Not Love the Lord

Hebrews 10:25 shows attendance to be a command of God: "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching." Obedience is proof of our love for the Lord. Jesus revealed, "If a man love me, he will keep my words..." (John 14:23). To forsake the assembling is to disobey the Lord!

Some Are Not Building Up the Church

Each member of the Lord's body has responsibility to supply a part to build up the church (Ephesians 4:10-16). Faithful attendance on the part of each member goes a long way in making the church a growing church!

Some Are Sick, Have Moved Away or Died

Let's not overlook the point that some seats are empty because folks are sick. Do these know we care? Some folks have moved away or passed away. When the faithful are gone, they are truly missed. Let us work to fill these seats with new converts by teaching others the will of God (2 Timothy 2:2)
